

LIGHT AND SHADE

My garden is twelve years old.

The existing ficus covered bluestone wall provided an opportunity to create a private shady garden that would establish a sense of calm upon entering the front gate. I retained a few shrubs and was keen to add much more planting with an emphasis on foliage.

I took cues from the white Edwardian house when selecting the additional plants, contributing to a restrained monochromatic colour palette. White Crepe Myrtles were added as anchor plants. The cinnamon bark of their sculptural trunks, their new spring growth tinged with bronze and fiery autumn tones all reference the home's terracotta roof tiles.

Slate crazy paving provides pattern and softness. Velvet silver-leaved *Plectranthus*, easily grown from cuttings, weaves amongst the small shrubs. 'Wild Swan' Anemones, (Chelsea '2011 Plant of the Year') were sourced from Lambley Nursery in Ascot and add to the woodland garden feel. Liliiums provide verticals long after their flowers are finished, with their sculptural brown seed pods. White Iceberg Roses were here when I arrived. Each year I vow to replace them as the shade increases. They remain for another year, but not forever. Winter pruning fully reveals a rusty sculpture by Neil Tait from Tait Decorative Iron in Castlemaine, moved from a previous garden.

Walk through the garage to the small north facing garden where a shed was removed, allowing for a curved garden bed and further crazy paving repeating the design language of the front garden's hard landscaping. I added a third white Crepe Myrtle to break up visually (rather than block out) the sight line of the neighbouring house; seen from the street, this tree provides a third form, especially when in its full autumn glory. The more shade-tolerant and less virulent form of the Virginia Creeper family, *Parthenocissus henryana* with its purple-backed leaves and beautiful deep venation (more prevalent in shade) provides contrast to the cinnamon bark and increases the perception of depth in this small space.

The main eastern back garden is unrecognisable from twelve years ago. A large c.1970's swimming pool dominated the entire garden with a little perimeter planting. Its bottom was smashed, a large concrete water tank was craned in, followed by a heavily engineered black steel pond dividing the garden from the decking. Positioned to be viewed from the front door, it extends the "spine" of the house with its central hallway. A stacked slate water wall was installed at the pond's end for better Feng Shui – allegedly bringing good luck and money back into the house! It has taken some years to get the planting right and at the time of writing this, three generations of fish are thriving.

As the back living area faced east, I was keen to have vivid chartreuse green viewed from within. *Gleditsia* trees were planted with one emerging from the top deck. An analogous colour scheme is used here for the planting choice, with the wedge of yellow, yellow-green and lime green from the colour wheel. No grass, rather a mass of textural evergreen underplanting akin to an embroidery and forgiving of the stray weed thrives here.

Korean Box, clipped into domes, were placed to look as though casually 'thrown' throughout the garden, becoming vital anchor plants during winter. Emergent Freesia bulbs bloom in spring, tropical lush Liliiums in early summer, the Gleditsias' vibrant golden Autumn tones and abundant winter flowering yellow Picotee Hellebores provide the yellow component of the scheme.

Being familiar with his sculptures at 'Cloudehill' in Olinda, I commissioned the artist, Ian Marr, from Orange in NSW to engrave four stones which are placed around the garden. His work is influenced by the Arcadian wonder of 'Little Sparta,' the late Ian Hamilton Finlay's garden in Dunsyre, Scotland; a fascinating garden with an abundance of stone pieces with exquisitely chiseled Roman type.

My raised vegetable garden bed was abandoned after some years through lack of care and time. Last summer a 'Golden Spirit' Cotinus was planted as a 'bridesmaid' anchor plant to support the main hero trees. Underplanting of sun and semi-shade tolerant Aeonium with their lime-green cabbage rosettes add another texture to the planting.

A few key plants used extensively in Japan are used throughout my garden: clipped Box, Nandina domestica, Mondo Grass, Camellia sp. and Japanese Anemones, all adding to the feeling of serenity.
