

GARDEN NOTES

PARNHAM FARM

When I first started working on this garden we were only looking at tidying up and making the area around the house look attractive and functional. Once we started however, seeing the difference and how pleasing it was visually, not just to the people living and visiting but also to the birds, bees and insects that started to thrive. Hence the garden started to grow.

In looking to expand the garden the obvious area to work towards was the west and the dam. It was also my intention to use the garden as a way to connect many of the activities surrounding the property.

With the view straight ahead from the house, the wetlands to the left and the tennis court and grazing paddocks beyond to the right, I realized very early in the planning, the dam and dam wall was the obvious place for the garden.

To create the right environment a lot of soil conditioning had to be done. The clay soil endemic to this area and the heavy rainfall made it at times a challenging project. The area is large and it has been a long and sometimes slow process just getting through the work needed for establishing plants.

Looking at the natural growth surrounding the property, careful consideration had to be given to ensure the new planting did not look incongruous and that although not all plants are native, it was essential that they all worked together. Plants that flower were chosen over ones that don't to encourage and feed birds and other flying insects.

It was also necessary to choose plants that could survive the conditions. Aside from the clay soil and excessive water there are strong winds and winter frosts. There are over 200 different species planted in this garden and around the property.

Parnham Farm Garden is a very unique garden and has been the most rewarding of all the gardens I have worked on. The more challenging it became the more I poured myself into finding solutions and forging ahead.

I could not have done this without the support and encouragement of the owners. For them and their friends, this is a wonderful meandering outdoor adventure.
